Medical Detection Dogs is the new name for that part of the charities work that utilises the smelling power of dogs by training them to assist people with brittle diabetes and addisons disease. They now have 20+ dogs living with patients and local Lions clubs in the 20 locations have contributed to the training of a dog for a local patient. These dogs really do transform peoples lives.

The waiting list for dogs is small but stable. 8 dogs are in training and Geoff Lambert. Treasurer of Dunstable Lions has agreed to walk Mount Kilimanjaro to raise further funds for the training of dogs to support those with diabetes.

other Nature seems to be determined to keep the Lions of the world busy because every time I turn around she has made another disaster somewhere in the world for Lions to react to and boy do they react.

In the past year we seem to have reeled from one emergency to another and as well as the terrible earthquake suffered by Christchurch, New Zealand we now have the earthquake and Tsunami in Japan with a huge loss of life and still more to come. Once again the Lions of the world have done what they do so well and have immediately organised fund raising projects to get money on the ground for the 100,000+ Japanese Lions to use to provide aid for those most in need.

So far the LCIF designated account for disaster relief and designated funds stands at US\$1.25 million which includes emergency grant funds and designated donations from Lions around the world. The LCIF executive committee is considering making donations MJF eligible.

Please forward designated donations from Clubs/individuals for this appeal through our district treasurer Vanmali Mistry. Cheques should be payable to "The LCI MD105 Appeal Fund" endorsed on the back "Japan Earthquake/Tsunami 2011".

In Christchurch Lions have signed a Memorandum of Understanding with the New Zealand Red Cross to enable us both to work closely together to bring aid where needed as the city is still without water, sewerage systems and the aftershocks continue. The

local Lions continue to meet together to plan how best to go forward even when they are personally affected by the disaster with house damage, the workplace closed, no power or water and still attended the Lions meeting to help their fellow citizens, (This is an actual description of a local Lion's actions).

On a brighter note a few weeks ago Jill and I have the pleasure of being invited to the first Charter of the Wembley, (Brent), Leos Club and I have to say that if any of you get the chance to go to a Leo event take it. The Leos were great, so full of energy and enthusiasm for Lions it was contagious and every one of the "older people" there were caught up in their joy for life and joined in. Thank you to all the Lions that advise and help the Leos within this District and please form some more Leo clubs as we certainly need them.

The District Convention earlier this month was a great success which, according to all the feedback I have had since, was enjoyed by everyone there.
