

Harpenden Lions Club lockdown initiatives

he Covid-19 lockdown have severely disrupted the activities of **Harpenden Lions Club** which, like many clubs, has resorted to virtual meetings and online fundraising and social events.

Aware that more families were visiting Food Banks, the services committee, under the leadership of Andrew Godden, applied for a share of the Community fund from the LCIF, inviting St. Albans Lions Club to do the same. Both clubs received grants of £250 which they used to make a donation of £500 to the St Albans and District Foodbank (a charity associated with the Trussell Trust).



Harpenden Lions Club followed this with a successful JustGiving appeal on behalf of the Foodbank, which has now received a further £2,500 (plus Gift Aid). Mark Pontin, a trustee of the Foodbank commented : "What a fantastic result. Thank you for organising and also to all your colleagues for their work in collecting on our behalf. Your donations will be used for both food purchase and the running of the foodbank. The sad thing is that the demand is still there and we suspect will increase once business starts up and redundancies follow."

Lockdown came in to effect right in the middle of the Harpenden Lions Club annual Easter Egg Raffle, which normally raises more than £2,500. With most establishments closed down the Club feared a poor result and that the Raffle might even lose money. Thanks to some creative thinking by some Easter Egg hosts and some Harpenden Lions (such as conducting Raffles via their street's WhatsApp group), it was possible to donate £1,318 to the charity Mind in Mid Herts. A very creditable result in such difficult circumstances.

Another successful local community initiative was an Art Competition for young people organised by Lion David Shall, with the support of two members of The Arts Society Harpenden, Evening (TASHE), who undertook the judging. There was a choice of 6 themes, with 3 age categories between 7 and 16. 112 young people entered the competition. Nine prize winning entries are shown in the composite photo. The prizes of £25, £15 and £10 were funded by club members. More recently a Zoom Quiz Night was organised for members

and the Harpenden Lions Highland Gathering, which is the club's main fundraiser each year. The loss of income from the Lions bookshop in Hemel Hempstead, which the club ran every Friday prior to lockdown, is also severely impacting the funds available for charitable donations and the challenge now is to identify new fundraising opportunities within the constraints of lockdown and social distancing.

Our LP used her good offices around the community to secure 18 tons of drinks and food items from McDonald's who had to remain closed due to the government guidelines. Southall Lions always happy to be a team players, offered these drinks and food to other Lions clubs in the area. The clubs that took advantage and collected the pallets of free drinks, included Lions Clubs of Wembley, Hendon, Sudbury and Fairlop for distribution to the needy in their areas.

A few of the Lion ladies and their friends got together and revived their stitching skills and stitched Scrubs for the front line. Yet another group showed their culinary skills and cooked meals for distribution to the local community. Southall Lions and friends donated funds to Akshaya Patra to enable them to prepare meals in bulk.

LP arranged a special cake on the occasion of Eid, to present to NHS 111 offices in Ealing in appreciation of the fine work they do. She also negotiated with local Fruit and Veg importers to donate their stock in large quantities.

Southall Lions Club has raised and spent £4,505, distributed 4,100 meals all this using 865 Lion hours. As the saying goes, "When the going gets tough – the tough get going".

London Central Host responds to NHS Scrubs Project

A community group in Hertfordshire and Buckinghamshire, South East Crafts for Causes, responded to the COVID 19 crisis by sewing hospital scrubs, scrub hats, scrub bags and other items for local hospitals and care homes to help their staff stay safe.

They had sewn 520 scrub sets plus thousands of other non-scrub items such as scrub hats and bags. Following on from their initial success, they further supplied 851 scrub sets, 746 scrub hats and 2941 scrub bags to Watford General Hospital, Stoke Mandeville Hospital, Luton and Dunstable Hospital, Barnet Hospital, UCLH, St Bernard's Hospital Ealing and several local hospices, GP surgeries and Care Homes.

The need for scrubs has continued as supply chains are still not up and running. They appealed for



funds to buy materials to meet further demand. Club Secretary Lion Manji Kara, whose wife Shantaben volunteered to sew scrubs and wash bags, led the appeal to members to donate funds.

LONDON CENTRAL HOST LIONS CLUB responded very generously by raising and donating £1000 to the NHS SCRUBS Project. Total donations to the South East Crafts reached a new target of nearly £16000; enough money to sew many more scrubs.

More fabric was purchased from supplier in Belgium and has been delivered to Stylex for cutting. Sewing 700 more scrub sets began first week of June. These next scrub sets will be distributed to West Herts Trust, Noah's Ark Children's Hospice London, Peace Hospice Watford and the Norwood Charity.

ear Lions,

I trust you are all well and keeping safe.

As I approach the last few weeks in office, I wanted to take this opportunity to say THANK YOU to you all for your support, hard work and efforts for delivering the goals and objectives which also includes District 105A leading in service, providing comprehensive training and gaining membership.

I recall that only last year in July when taking oath of the office of District Governor, one realises, the magnitude of responsibility and the aspirations of clubs and members who rely on the DG to take the right decisions and also give direction where and when required.

Let us not forget the British Isles was completely transformed following the redistricting and it was reduced from 12 to 8 Districts. Our District had its own challenges where 4 clubs and nearly 58 members transferred to the new districts.

Albeit, making changes to the cabinet structure and placing emphasis on training, membership and service with the view all five core pillars were prioritised. Certain changes were required and it was important every member of the cabinet participated and took ownership of their remit. It was also good to see Dent Aid, Water Aid, Cancer, physical learning disabilities, DBS making significant contribution to the debate and making a difference. The advisory committee (Zone Chairs) went the extra mile to ensure clubs received the support required and service activities.

The Clubs responded to the call of recruiting one member per club to supplement the shortfall. Within six months membership increased by 75 but it was noticed there were some historical discrepancies on how some clubs had been reporting numbers. It was decided for the benefit of reporting true status of actual numbers every detail was checked and cross referenced and numbers adjusted accordingly. Park Royal was deleted and we have yet to hear from the Palace of Westminster as these numbers have been omitted from the count.

It was also important to ensure Clubs who were required to enrol as CIO members did so. Today there are about 49 clubs which have registered and 9 are on route and about 5 clubs below the 5K threshold. Subsidised training for club trustees was also provided by the District and to-date 9 more members were trained to be certified Guiding Lions.

There was representation at the Council of Governors meetings and issues such as supporting members and clubs during COVID 19 were discussed including International and MD dues. Lions International responded by providing emergency grants and support in helping clubs and members by lifting deadlines on fees including providing additional grants for the Air Ambulances across the UK. It should be noted that the International Convention due at the end of June in Singapore, as well as the MD Convention were cancelled. The present Governors have put forward proposal to ensure DGE's are recognised.

After having spoken to the District Treasurer Vanmali Mistry, it was decided that the District will support each Club and member during these difficult times. I also want to extend my heartfelt thanks to our Treasurer, Lion Vanmali for his unconditional commitment and dedication to the District for nearly 35 years. He is retiring from his post and will continue to mentor Kunal Vyas who was appointed as his deputy at the start of the year.

Today despite the challenging COVID-19 circumstance facing us and by helping each other, it is amazing how you the members have taken this in your stride. Many clubs have adopted the change by having conducted ONLINE Meetings and almost all clubs finalized the new teams for year 2020/21.

I believe it was important to open communication channels with members and clubs and on my part, it was imperative the link to the District was maintained at all times. It was good to note many of you called for support, advice and importantly keeping safe.

During the year, it was good to be a part of many club's achievements and celebrations. Here are some of them:

- Donation of £5,500 towards a mini bus for the ELHAP.
- Equipment to Little Heath School.
- Over £13,000 raised from various clubs for Spot Camera we should be able to purchase 4 cameras for the district.
- Helping the Fulham Scouts Club with a donation.
- Engaging with Young Farmers to promote membership. GMT lead now actively involved to ensure a working partnership can be developed.
- Senior Citizen Party The biggest showcase in our District which once again put a smile on all those who attended and may people very happy.
- Eye Sight Projects in Surat India and supporting widows and families in Surat and Punjab.
- New waiting room called the Lion's Den opened in Milton Keynes General Hospital.
- The 55th District Convention exceeded all expectation and we have raised the bar. For all those who attended the three events which were booked on line for the 1st time were very complimentary and I want to thank the entire convention team for delivering such a wonderful event.
- Over 150 volunteer seamstresses in Hertfordshire and Buckinghamshire have been requested to make scrubs for different NHS hospitals and Care Homes. They have supplied Stoke Mandeville Hospital, Luton and Dunstable Hospital, West Hertfordshire Hospital, Northwick Park Hospital, Barnet Hospital Midwifery department, as well as St Joseph's Care Home in Tring, Willen Hospice in Luton, the Hospice of St Francis in Berkhamsted, Peace Hospice

in Watford, Noah's Ark Childrens Hospice in Barking, Woodland Park Residential Home in Great Missenden, and additional care homes in Hillingdon, Southall, Aylesbury, and Milton Keynes to name just a few.

- The Pride of Lions for the month of May was dedicated to Lockdown where clubs were able to present their articles.
 Every Pride of Lion represented our success.
- Many clubs using the guidance of how to cope during lockdown and useful links to how to use Zoom meetings, LCI Website, Quiz Programs have continued to interact with their members.

I do sincerely believe by adopting an open and transparent policy of discussing pressing matters related to the wellbeing of the District and its members has made us more coherent, sympathetic, mature and realistic of our challenges and objectives.

such have clocked so many hours helping with the cause. The three Lion medical practitioners who came out of retirement are continuing with the excellent work.
