
PDG Ram Jaggi is an MBE!

Lions throughout the multiple district were indeed pleased to hear that her Majesty, The Queen had graciously appointed PDG Ram Jaggi a Member of the order of the British Empire (MBE) in Her Majesty's Birthday Honours List for "charitable services through Lions Clubs International'

Lion Ram served as District Governor of District 105a in 2001-2002.

Over the years he has received numerous awards and accolades from Lions Clubs International including two International Leadership Awards, International President's Appreciation Medals, International President 's Certificate and



Plaque for outstanding work for Campaign Sight-First and six International President's Certificates of Appreciation.

He was also presented the International LCIF Chairman Certificate of Appreciation for outstanding work at the International Convention in Birmingham 1997-98 and was made the District Lion of the Year in 1992-1993.

3 NEW CLUB COMING NEXT YEAR, THANKS TO THIS YEAR'S TEAM

Our MERCL team together with the membership extension have been laying the foundation to open several new Clubs during 2005 - 2006.



At least 3 Clubs are at a very advanced stage of formation:

London University New Century - due to the exams and holidays the club is likely to be formed later on in the year. There are 20 prospective members as per the report from Membership/ MERCL committee.

It has been reported that Twickenham is likely to be formed in the new Lionistic year. A further Club is expected to be formed in August/ September in Gerrards Cross, where a number of prospective candidates have been identified.

In the interim period we have launched further 2 Branch Clubs. Fulham Club, branch of Ealing Lions Club with 14 members and Osterley Club branch of Feltham and Whitton with 8 new members. - see picture above.

Both of these Club Branches together with Fairlop will have the potential of being a full Club within the short period.

We have throughout the year put emphasis on the retention and targeted growth with quality membership. We feel confident that with work undertaken for growth this year and with the help of all concerned we should see the formulation of 3-5 new clubs early next year.

I would like to thank Clubs in the District for their support in their support and their response to the Tsunami Disaster and donations to LCIF including Melvin Jones Fellowship Awards which exceeded 100++.
