Child Sight UK MD105 Child Vision Screening Programme

We have now completed three trials, screened 670 young people and issued 73 referral letters, meaning that 10.9 % of all those screened needed further assessment by health-care professionals.

The initial feedback from these schools has been very positive and a number of young people referred to the optician are under complex medical investigations.

Watch out for updates in the next few months on the training opportunities within your District as we start to roll out the screening program across MD105.

This is a great opportunity for Lions Clubs to engage with their local community & schools, and to raise awareness of one of our five core service activities.

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Leadership – what it *really* means

My dictionary defines leadership as “*guiding or inspiring others*”. In other words leadership provides opportunities. This applies as much to Lions as to leadership within any organisation. I understand that whilst the concept of leadership is something many Lions appear to shy away from, should it not be the concept every Lion aspires to and embraces: by virtue of what we Lions do?

Here is just a selection of examples which will be familiar to you all and where individual Lions act as Leaders on a regular basis: delivering support to a local individual in need; collecting someone from their home for a medical appointment; links with the local press; a link with local Social Services; arranging the rotas for the Christmas Float; chairing Club Meetings; arranging social events; leading a team at a local major event eg: Fun Day or Fireworks Display. This is about being part of a team, mapping the way forward, achieving a shared vision and motivating others to achieve successfully.

It is often stated that ‘*Great Leaders started their journey as Great Followers*’: learning as they travelled about what works, and even more importantly, what does not work. All organisations, including Lions Clubs, needs structure with various levels of responsibilities.

If you wish to take your own personal ambitions within lionism further, then do so! It is perfectly acceptable to advance your own credentials and ambitions. These Lions need our full support and encouragement. But please, if you aim to take your personal leadership ambitions further, seek to go only as far as you know you are comfortable with, and remain at a level where you will succeed.

I have said that as Lions we are naturally Leaders, and within Clubs, Districts and the Multiple District there is a pressing need for strong Leaders – but this has to be about those who wish to be Leaders. Willing Leaders will lead successfully, reluctant Leaders will not.

Finally, remember these tips to being a successful Leader:

- create excitement and fun within the activities you promote;
- engage with the hearts of those around you;
- do not attempt to micro-manage (*in other words do not attempt to do it all yourself*) and do not burn the candle at both ends.

Whatever roles you decide are for you... enjoy the experience.
